## "Supporting Ourselves, Supporting Our World"

The New Horizons for Seniors Program focuses on engaging seniors as community leaders to share their expertise and to engage folks of all ages to build a welcoming, active community. Our vision was to learn more about climate change and how we, in our community, can model measures to mitigate the impact of climate change locally. Through these activities we were also able to build some community connections (much needed after 2 quiet years). We had a very active community of seniors take the lead with a variety of experiences and skills to share in relation to this initiative.

## Burlington Community Club Project Update

Over the past few months we have been working diligently to design and create a community park that will encourage community folk to exercise and enjoy the natural environment with native plants as well as some trees native to the Acadian Forest. This will be a "work in progress" as our plantings establish and grow. Going forward we will need help planting some saplings this spring once the snow disappears. Watch our sign board for a date & time!

Last spring we prepared a garden plot for cultivating some native plants this year. Carolyn Green, a master gardener associated with the Blomidon Naturalists Society, gave us lots of tips on what to plant. We also sought advice from Paul Grimm on tree plantings and were able to purchase saplings for spring planting.

In the fall of 2022 Kenneth Lutz Excavating put in over 350 meters of crusher dust trails under the supervision of Jason Daniels. These are accessible trails on which we encourage folks to walk or wheel. Please no motorised vehicles except wheel chairs. On the Winter Solstice approximately 200 folks from Harbourville, Burlington & nearby communities joined us for a Ribbon Cutting ceremony on the trails. Phil Hare organized the Water Solstice event that included a candlelit walk around the trails, a bonfire, a flame juggler and treats afterwards at the hall accompanied with a performance by Zak Miller.

We also hosted a presentation in November by Jennika Hunsinger on the Nova Scotia Working Woodlands Trust.

Currently the plan is in place to build a small bridge over the creek behind the horse pull area. Our signs have been designed and will be installed in the spring.

We were able to secure a Grant from the Municipality for the County of Kings to complete some of the trail work. This is your park and we look forward to your input on future projects as well as your help to keep The Burlington Community Park responsive to community interests. Why not join us at our Annual General Meeting on April 22 at noon at the Burlington Community Hall?

### Harbourville Restoration Society Project Update The Harbourville Restoration Society has been very busy this winter season.

On January 28<sup>th</sup> Vivre Whiteway gave a workshop on plant-based cooking. She gave a demonstration on techniques focussing on east Indian and Thai food traditions. This was followed by a group meal where participants tested the different foods that Vivre had prepared. The workshop had a fun and lively spirit as participants learned from Vivre and shared their cooking experiences.

Sunday, February 5<sup>th</sup>'s workshop, titled "Taking Stock" and led by Trefor Reynoldson and Peter Sheppard, invited participants to measure their "carbon footprint" as the entry point for identifying strategies to address climate change on the North Mountain. The results of this session are forming the basis for group activities to increase our respectful use of the North Mountain's natural resources.

The February 19<sup>th,</sup> workshop titled, Keeping a Healthy Immune System, was led by Lois Hare and Jacquie Dale, who shared their extensive knowledge of how foods and herbs from our gardens can be used to enhance our health and wellbeing.

A highlight of the winter season was the Crokinole Tournament. Brian Hirtle and his son Chris Hirtle were the winners. We hope this will become an annual event.

Linda Dale is finishing up the oral history project and soon will have a booklet to share with the community reflecting what has been learned through interviews with local folks about how residents of the North Mountain have managed its resources in the past. We have a rich history in fishing, forestry and agriculture due to the resilience of our community. This will compliment the *From the Brow to the Bay Book* published in 2012.

We are wrapping up our project with 2 community celebrations. Please refer to advertisements in this Special Edition Newsletter.

Saturday, April 1<sup>st</sup>, 7 pm: Come to the Harbourville Hall for a celebration of the completion of Supporting Ourselves, Supporting Our World, a project jointly coordinated by HRS and the Burlington Community Park Society. Special presentations by local artists and the results of the high school video project will be followed by a dance and delicious treats made by Fiona Lewis, an amazing chef. The event is free but we welcome donations for the Turkey/Syria earthquake recovery.
